

## LORD ASHCROFT PARTY FUNDING POLL APRIL 2012

1,000 adults were interviewed online on 30 and 1 April 2012. Results have been weighted to be representative of all adults in Great Britain.

### 1. Voting intention

Labour	41%
Conservative	32%
Liberal Democrat	11%
Others	16%

### 2. I am going to read out some words and phrases that have been used to describe different political parties. Regardless of which party you would vote for, please say if you think the word or phrase is true of Labour/the Conservative Party/the Liberal Democrats.

- Those who had heard a great deal or quite a lot about the recent Conservative Party donors story were not significantly less likely than voters as a whole to think the Conservative Party was "honest and principled".
- Those who had heard a great deal or quite a lot about the party funding story, the "granny tax" and the new taxes on hot pies and pasties were no more or less likely than voters as a whole to think the Conservative Party "shares my values", or is "for ordinary people, not just the well off".

- People who had heard a great deal or quite a lot about the recent Conservative Party funding story were no more or less likely than voters as a whole to think parties should be able to accept donations from whoever they like as long as they declare them. They were very slightly more likely than voters as a whole to think Britain is one of the least corrupt countries in the world.

**6. Some people believe that political parties often give individual donors a say over their policies in return for large donations. Others argue that they do not in fact do this, since they will want to make sure that their policies appeal to as many voters as possible, whatever their donors think. How often do you think political parties in Britain adopt or change policies because donors ask them to?**

**7. Which of the main parties do you think is most likely to give donors a say over its policies in return for large donations?**

- Conservative voters were the only group in which a higher proportion thought the Labour Party was the most likely to give donors a say over its policies in return for large donations.

**8. The Labour Party receives most of its funding from trade unions. The Conservative Party receives most of its money from private donations. Both amount to several million pounds a year. Which do you think is worse?**
