
## THE ASHCROFT NATIONAL POLL 19 JANUARY 2015

1,004 adults were interviewed by telephone between 16 and 18 January 2015. Results have been weighted to be representative of all adults in Great Britain. Half of the interviews were conducted by landline and half by mobile phone. Results are weighted by recalled past vote at the last general election and stated likelihood to turn out at the next. A proportion of those who don't know or refuse to say how they will vote are re-allocated to the party they voted for at the 2010 general election. Labour	28% (-)
Liberal Democrats	9% (+1)
UKIP	15% (-1)
Green	11% (+3)
Others	9% (+3)
